CLSA Chair Bill Waddington today welcomed the Bar's opposition to the QASA scheme, aimed at regulating Criminal Advocates. The CLSA has responded to every consultation on QASA questioning the need for the scheme. There is ample provision within the existing regulatory framework for Solicitors and Barristers to deal with issues that arise with Crown Court Advocacy standards. The proposed scheme would be bureaucratic and expensive to administer for advocates, the judiciary and the Courts Service. At a time of unprecedented spending cuts it is time for the professional regulators to take a step back and listen to both sides of the profession who are now united in calling for a halt to this unnecessary scheme."

Notes to Editors:

- 1. QASA is the Quality Assurance Scheme for Advocates, a scheme designed to assess advocates (Solicitors and Barristers) abilities in Criminal Cases. It is a hugely controversial scheme, consistently objected to by Solicitors' representative groups as well as some senior Judges. Until recently barristers' representatives groups (but not all barristers) supported the scheme but more recently the Criminal Bar Association has voiced its opposition to the scheme.
